Review the readings a second time, and note the verbal and nonverbal language depicted. Create your own graphic organizer to respond to the following prompts:

- 1. What verbal and nonverbal language stands out to you?
- 2. In what ways does that language empower some groups and disempower other groups?
- 3. Who is privileged and who is oppressed by the kinds of behavior and language we sometimes see in sport sites?
- 4. What do you see in the text that combats this privileging and oppression of certain groups?

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Interrogating the Culture of School Sports: Focusing on Sociopolitical Issues

As we prepare to share in small groups and as a whole class, please keep in mind our class expectations regarding civil discourse:

- Do not tell others how they should feel.
- Do not single out individuals to be spokespeople for their race, gender, class standing, sexual orientation, religious beliefs, etc.
- Ask or state questions and comments in a way that will promote greater understanding rather than defensiveness.
- Share and actively listen to views with which you both agree and disagree in order to advance your own learning.

Partner or Small-Group Share: Jot down new understandings gleaned from your conversation. Attribute ideas to specific classmates.
Preparing for whole-class discussion: Review your notes on the texts and from your partner or small-group conversation. Star or highlight at least two ideas or questions (yours or your classmate's) that you want to share with the whole class Class Discussion: Jot down new perspectives and insights from the discussion. Attribute ideas to specific classmates.

Independent Reflection: Review your freewriting and your notes over the readings, and return to this question: <i>Are student locker rooms, training facilities, pep assemblies, and competition venues safe places for everyone?
